## Research Activity

### **Research Activities**

My research focuses primarily on two areas: (1) the social and policy determinants of substance use from childhood to adulthood; and (2) the causes, consequences, and prevention of violence. In my most recent work, I have applied methods from epidemiology, statistics, econometrics, and computer science to answer important questions about the impact that interventions at the local, city, state, and national level can have on substance abuse and violence. I have published more than 120 original, peer-reviewed research articles, five textbook chapters, and 10 commentaries. My research was cited at least 3,117 times, and I have an h-index of 38. In addition, I have received 5 large, extramural awards as PI (1 K01, 2 R01s, 2 R21s) and have been awarded \$3,943,568 in research funds as PI.
